

### Reflections from Kim

It's a breezy summer is it not? The wind has certainly been a feature of our weather this year. Good for kite flying and sailing, and for those of us in most of Scotland, good for keeping the midges at bay. Not so good for sitting out in the sun unless you can find a sheltered spot and not so good for cycling unless it's at your back, and the cyclists among us will know that it never quite seems to be at your back for very long!

The wind is also good for drying washings and I saw one last week on a croft in Sutherland, the wooden poles set in the heather with the sky and the sea all around. Now call me old fashioned, but the sight of a washing blowing and flapping on a line in the sun and the wind gladdens my heart. Especially if it is a 'well pit oot' line of washing with the towels together, the shirts the right way round and the socks in pairs. I can't help it, I was taught laundry at school and the importance of an orderly washing line was drummed into us both at school and at home. Incidentally, in Sutherland, there is a unique way of pegging the sheets on the line which lets the wind blow through and deters them taking off across the heather.

What difference does it make how you hang up your washing I hear you ask, and of course you are absolutely right, the sun and the wind will dry the washing however it may be hung on the line. This was the topic of conversation in the Wattlot household recently. Does it really matter? How important to us is our sense of order, our insistence that things should be done in a certain way? Should preference take precedence over purpose? Should fondness for our way of doing things get in the way of our relationships?

God loves it when we do things for others and His Kingdom grows, and if it is a bit clumsy and not done

perfectly, then will he love us less? Of course not! Who has not appreciated and loved their children's first attempts at making breakfast in bed, even if the tea was cool and the toast not quite brown enough? Who has not appreciated a washing being hung out, even if the socks were not in pairs? These are acts



of love and service and they gladden not just our hearts but God's too. He wants us to do things, and not be discouraged because we might not do it perfectly or delay trying because of a lack of confidence in our own skills. In his sermon on the mount, Jesus taught his disciples to let their light shine so that everyone would see what they were doing and praise the Father in Heaven. He also taught that loving and serving others brought joy in Heaven. As we learn to love, as we learn to serve, we develop a yearning to be better at what we do and delight in it and we have the faith and hope to know that God's wonderful grace will be at work to help us.

In my study there are some cards and 'things' which I keep to help me to remember how dependent I am on God's grace and other people. They encourage me and remind me that we are at our best when we do things together and together with God. I think I might bring up a clothes peg to add to my collection!

#### THE VACANCY AS IT PROGRESSES

One of my tasks as your interim moderator, was to read the edict, required by Church of Scotland procedure in relation to the piece of church law: *Ministers and Deacons in civil Partnerships and Same Sex Marriages Act.* It sounded quite complicated, simply because it is a legal document. I will be required to repeat the edict reading in September at the time of the second secret ballot. The voting procedure is necessary because, as part of the process of the vacancy, the Kirk Session undertakes to decide if it will permit the nominating committee to consider an application for this vacancy from an individual who is already in a civil partnership or same-sex marriage. This part of the vacancy procedure relating to departure must be completed before the vacancy can be advertised and the congregation can vote to elect the nominating committee.


So that you know who is responsible for what, the decision relating to possible departure is the responsibility of the Kirk Session, the election of the members of the nominating committee is the responsibility of the congregation, the choice of any sole nominee is decided by the elected nominating committee and the choice of the minister is made by the congregation.

These are all serious undertakings and this is a time of change and new possibilities. Yet we have our hope in the Lord and the sure and certain knowledge that His grace abounds. Be assured that you are all in my prayers and I ask again that you remember the folk of the Kirk Session and each other in your prayers as we move forward through the vacancy procedures.

We were so captivated by her story that we asked her to let us know her plans. She has also promised to keep us up to date with her life in ...... read on for more!

Right now, the boxes are piled high, the paperwork extensive and the twists and turns of bureaucracy seem never ending. However, in a little over a week from the date I write this, I will be cruising at 35,000 feet – making a hop around the world towards my

new job and life in Shanghai, China.

I have spent the last 7 years as a Head Teacher of an Additional Support Needs School in Ardrossan. Now I am moving 5,500 miles around the globe to seek out new life experiences, and most importantly, new challenges. I will be working as the Lower School

Coordinator in the Yew Chung International School of Shanghai, with some ongoing input into helping children who have additional needs. Callum, 22, is about to take up his first post as a doctor in the surgical department of the Queen Elizabeth University Hospital in Glasgow and Gemma, 20, is moving to Milton Keynes to pursue a qualification as a Royal Academy of Dance ballet teacher.

My children have been immensely supportive of my decision to move to China.

As for now, it's back to the packing for me, but I will keep you all posted with any updates and how I'm getting on!

The Sunday Lunch That Cooks To Perfection While You Sleep On Saturday Night!!!!

#### Slow Cooked Neck Fillets Of Lamb

This cut of lamb is widely available in the local supermarkets....Tesco, Asda and Morrisons both at their fresh meat counters and in the displays of vacuum packed products. Local butchers tend to include this cut in "best end" of rolled lamb so you are unlikely to find them in their shops.

However, this is one of the most succulent cuts when slow cooked and is about a third of the cost of "Rack" or "Canon"......a real "melt in the mouth" experience.

You will need an electric slow cooker. First, trim off any excess fat with a thin bladed sharp knife....then every half inch of the fillet length make a cut half way through the meat, this makes for even cooking. Place the fillets in your slow cooker and give them a good grind of both black pepper and sea salt. Close the lid of your cooker and set the heat setting switch to LOW .....that is it!!!!.....Go to bed.....and on the Sunday morning, turn off the cooker and lift out each fillet and place on a chopping board to rest for 5/10 minutes. Pour off the julces of the meat into a glass tumbler and place it in your fridge for an hour or so until any excess fat comes to the surface, sets and can be removed from the glass. With the clarified juices make the gravy of your choice.....with the addition of mint jelly or perhaps rich Madeira sauce.

When the meat has rested cut each fillet into medallions and place in a ceramic chafing dish, pour over your gravy and cover the dish with kitchen foil...."shiny side down"!!!! Place the dish/dishes on a middle shelf of your oven and regenerate at 140C for 20/25 minutes when you get home from the Kirk. Serve with a selection of vegetables and mashed potato.

Easy!!!.....and amazing!!!

One of the

really lovely aspects of doing these interviews is having the opportunity to talk to and find out about members of our church from a wide age range. I think it is fair to say that Vanessa belongs in the younger category.

As many of you know Vanessa is a Yorkshire lass from Huddersfield. Her family belonged to the Baptist Church, where she spent her childhood years. When she was only seventeen, her mum noticed an advert in a church publication looking for someone to train as a domestic in a Christian outdoor centre run by the Abernethy Trust in Shiskine on the Isle of Arran. Undaunted, the young Vanessa applied and was accepted for the position, and consequently travelled to Arran for the first time. In my conversations with Vanessa it soon becomes apparent that she is

someone who displays great strength of character. She absolutely loved the job and remained in post for three years. While in Shiskine she met future husband Max, who was working at the centre as an outdoor instructor. Although from Hereford, Max spent most of his childhood in Largs.

At the age of twenty Vanessa returned to Huddersfield, where she and Max were married in 1991. Their next move was back north to the village of Sorn, where they settled in a cottage in the castle grounds. Max was now working at Kaimes Outdoor centre near Muirkirk, while Vanessa worked for a local family as a mother's help. Their next move was up the road to Mauchline where they joined the local parish church, becoming very involved in church life. Vanessa was a Sunday School teacher, and both she and Max ran the Youth Group. She still remains very friendly with the minister's wife from that time. Vanessa's love of Scotland dates back to a teenage holiday she spent in Pitlochry. As a family the Twomeys enjoy the outdoor life.

Ten years ago the family moved to Kilmarnock, when Max got a job in East Kilbride as Duke of Edinburgh Awards Manager for South Lanarkshire. Vanessa could be described as a "domestic goddess" helping regular clients in their homes. It is a job whish she can organise around the lives of the children. Vanessa and Max have two children – Tilly, who is fourteen and attends St. Joseph's Academy, and nine year old Kayden, who is a pupil at St. Andrew's Primary. 


