
May we take time to think about the poor, the prisoners, the blind and oppressed in our midst and around our world in this season.

KPPC GUILD



SCOTLANDS SACRED ISLANDS WITH BEN FOGLE

What you will need:


- A paper plate

JOHN MACMILLAN

Many of you will know I spent all my formative years in what was Henderson until I left for Fenwick in 1989 then aged 32 or so. The next 24 years were in Fenwick and the most recent 11 years have been in Wormit Fife. I made my living, like my father Iain, in the law.

Away back in about 1974 or 1975, the Rev John Weir Cook asked me if I felt a Call to ministry. I really did not at that stage. The vocation that did attract me was law and I really enjoyed all of my career.

As that career was winding to a conclusion however, in amongst the aftermath of Iain and Edith's deaths in 2019, and the general consequences of Covid and Presbytery planning in late 2020, there emerged for me a real sense of Call to do something in God's ministry. That all led to a longish path towards Readership which I finally completed in August this year. In short, that involved what is called Discernment and Local Review to test that Call, then two years of University study albeit part time, and two rigorous placements with Ministers, one in Dundee and one in Cupar. I was passed through the University education in June (Certificate in Higher Education) and through the final preaching assessment at the end of August.

On 28/11 I am to be Set Apart as a Reader, as the church describes it. It's like a formal commissioning. It will be in Cupar St John's. Anyone who would like to attend will be welcome of course but it's an awfully long way from Kilmarnock. I recommend the live streaming!

Although the Call emerged in Fife in 2020, be in no doubt that JWC's question never really left me alone over 45 years and that the foundation stones for all this were laid in Henderson on the banks of the Kilmarnock Water a very long time ago. I have much for which to thank the Henderson church community, and latterly the Kay Park church community, which I came to know through my parents' experiences in their latter years.

So my warm thanks to you all and my prayers for continuing blessings to KPPC in the months and years ahead.

THE CHRISTMAS TABLECLOTH

The new pastor and his wife had been assigned to their first charge, to re open a church in Brooklyn. They arrived early in October and were very excited. When they saw the church it was very run down and needed much work. They set a goal to have all the work done in time to have the first service on Christmas Eve.

They worked hard repairing pews, plastering walls, painting and so on. On 18th December they were ahead of schedule and nearly finished. Then on 19th a terrible storm hit the area and lasted 2 days.

When it was over the pastor went to the church, his heart sank when he saw that the roof had leaked and a chunk of plaster had fallen off the wall, just behind the pulpit. He cleared up as best he could and thinking he would have to cancel the Christmas Eve service he headed home.

On the way he passed a charity sale so he went in. One of the items was a beautifully crocheted tablecloth. It was exquisite work, it was ivory with a cross embroidered right in the centre in beautiful colours. It was just big enough to cover the damage to the wall so he bought it and started to head back to the church.

By this time it had started to snow, he saw an elderly lady hurrying to catch a bus, which she missed. He invited her to come into the church and wait until the next bus was due. She sat quietly in a pew while the pastor got a ladder and put the tablecloth up as a wall hanging. It fitted beautifully and he was feeling very pleased.

He then noticed the woman walking down the aisle, her face was white as a sheet. She asked him where he had got the cloth, when he explained she asked him to look at the bottom right corner to see if the initials EBG were there. They were. She had made this cloth 35 years ago in Austria.

She explained that before the war she and her husband were well to do people in Austria, she was captured, sent to prison and never saw her husband or home again.

The pastor wanted to give her the cloth but she made him keep it for the church, the least he could do was drive her home.

What a wonderful service they had on Christmas Eve, the church was almost full. At the end of the service the pastor and his wife greeted everyone at the door and wished them a Merry Christmas.

One older man was still sitting in the pew staring ahead, he asked the pastor where he had got the tablecloth on the wall because it was identical to one his wife had made many years ago in Austria. He explained how he had forced his wife to flee for her safety and he would follow, but he was arrested and put in prison. He never saw his wife or his home again.

The pastor asked him if he would come with him for a short drive. They drove to the house he had visited earlier in the week, knocked on the door and the pastor saw the greatest Christmas reunion he could have imagined.
