A WORD FROM THE MINISTER

I have shared in various contexts over recent weeks about Antakya in Turkey, an area devastated by the recent earthquakes which was known in ancient times as Antioch. We read of Antioch in the New Testament of the Bible in the book of Acts chapter 11. Believers who were facing persecution scattered and some ended up in Antioch and started sharing the Good News about Jesus.

'Then Barnabas went to Tarsus to look for Saul and when he found him, he brought him to Antioch. So for a whole year Barnabas and Saul met with the church and taught great numbers of people. **The disciples were called Christians first in Antioch' (Acts 11 v 25 & 26).**

Watching the reports from the now destroyed city of Antakya is all the more poignant when you know this piece of history. It reminds us how connected we all are. At the evening service of prayer and healing in Iona Abbey the day after the news of the earthquakes had spread across the world, heavy stone rubble from the Abbey was placed on the table at the service. These words of prayer were then shared;


God of shadow

A pair of Communion Flagons inscribed for the High Church Kilmarnock in loving memory of William A. Railton Architect and an ordained elder of the Church, these were gifted in 1905 by his family.

A pair of circular Alms plates silver plated.



Christening Bowl, gifted to the High Church, Kilmarnock in memory of Thomas Fulton of Braehead, Writer and Sheriff Clerk 1900. The Kirk Session made the decision at the end of 2022 to use the Old High Communion Silver as it hasn't been out on display for the last 10 years since the union of the two churches. The first opportunity came on 5th February 2023. The Silver was collected from the bank where it has been stored, it was polished and put out on display. The following photos show how it looked and there are also descriptions and information about the items.



A wooden cased travelling Communion set consisting of a chalice, a paten and a glass bottle, these were presented to the High Kirk of Kilmarnock by the women's Guild and the Girl Guides in May 1920

There sincere thanks to Rev Fiona for her attentiveness during Gordon's final days, her support was much needed and appreciated by the whole family.





EASTER PALM CROSSES


The Palm Crosses that you will receive this Easter have come all the way from Masasi, Tanzania.

The African Palms project was started in 1965 by Fr Alan Talbot an Anglican Priest who served for 6 years as a missionary in the Diocese of Masasi, Tanzania. The main aim of the project was to give local villagers a chance to earn some extra money to supplement their meagre income, whilst retaining dignity and the ability to carry on their farming work.

The Palm Crosses are made from dried branches of the dwarf palm Hyphaene Coriacea. These grow wild in the Masasi area, so are not cultivated or chemically treated, furthermore no trees are cut down in the work of collecting the Palm leaves for plaiting the Palm Crosses.

In 1986 the company African Palms Ltd was formed and all profits made by African Palms Ltd are used in educational and healthcare projects. For the last 5 years The African Palms Association has worked closely with the diocese of Masasi on many projects, including clean water supplies for the villages where the Palm Crosses are made as well as hostels and safehouses. At present work is progressing on building a new maternity unit at Rondo hospital, the project has increased in size and scope and is now nearing completion.
